

# 2004 Health of Orange County Report



#### Introduction

Healthy Carolinians of Orange County (HCOC) and the Orange County Health Department compiled the information in this report. It summarizes the work of the past year, since the community health assessment was completed, and gives an update on the major health indicators included in the Health of Orange County Report presented in 2002. Orange County continues to show improvement and have excellent rates for most health indicators. The County also shows significantly lower rates of morbidity and mortality in many areas than the state average.

A great deal of progress has been made in response to the 2003 community assessment and the priority issue areas that were chosen by the community at that time. Healthy Carolinians and our community partners are working together to address the inter-related areas of mental health, substance abuse and access to care. We are working to improve access to services, raise awareness about health issues in the community and bring programs together to address these needs.

#### Priority Issues chosen in 2003 community assessment:

- ► Access to health care
- ► Substance abuse
- ► Dental health

- **►** Suicide

- ► Obesity and overweight
- ► Mental health
- ► Air quality
- ► Child abuse and neglect

### **Accomplishments for 2004**

- The HCOC Advocates for Children Committee organized 14 training programs. Sessions were on child abuse, domestic violence and other issues related to these topics. Over 120 professionals from more than 40 agencies have attended one or more of these sessions.
- The HCOC Advocates for Adolescents Committee is developing a listing of 50 "teen friendly" mental health providers. The list will be distributed to service providers, schools and families throughout the county and on-line, in order to increase access to services.
- The HCOC Healthy Choices Committee conducted an assessment of Orange County worksites and the employee wellness program. They are now working to develop a new and improved wellness program for over 800 Orange County employees in partnership with BCBSNC.
- To increase physical activity, a recreation map was completed that includes all of the public recreation areas in the county encompassing over 60 locations administered by 15 different organizations.
- HCOC and the health department have collaborated with other groups to advocate for school-based mental health services, expansion of primary care services and an increased number of Medicaid providers.
- HCOC is currently partnering with UNC-CH to better understand the epidemiology and significance of the data on cancer, suicide and unintentional injuries.
